
Thanks Pauline, I didn't know there are so many species of bird in Kingston!

Cookie treat @ home

Rocky Road cookies

1 batch

300g/10oz milk chocolate

200g/7oz mini marshmallows

100g/4oz/2/3 a cup of hazelnuts

1 pack of rich tea biscuits
