
During the story stop and ask questions such as: -






How much is in my purse?



Science Activity



You could try this experiment to test how seeds grow

Equipment. You will need:

4 plastic bags, 4 paper towels, 4 seeds – 2 ordinary and 2 which have been baked

Method:

1. Moisten the paper towels with enough water to make them damp, but not sopping wet.
2. Put a paper towel into each sealable plastic bag.
3. Carefully insert a seed or pip between the paper towel and plastic.
4. Label the baked seed bags with a marker.
5. Make sure you can observe the seeds through the plastic bag.
6. Seal the bags, leaving a small corner of the bag open for circulation.
7. Tape a bag of each seed (non-baked and baked) to the inside of a sunny window and the other two to an area of the room that receives little sun.



Not got any seeds or pips? Try these time lapse videos instead!



What will happen to the seeds?

PREDICT: Write down what you think will happen

Will they all grow?
Will only some grow?

OBSERVE: Keep a diary to observe and record what happens each day

CONCLUSION: What happens? Were you right? What does it tell you about seeds?



Creative Activity


This week you could **create your own African mask**
