
My attempt to learn a TikTok dance is not going very well. It's really tricky! I think if you watched me trying, it would make you giggle ut my daughter is getting the hang of it.

I'm also enjoying the sunny days, admiring spring flowers and reading some good books to relax. Lulu's really enjoying the sun too!



We are going to continue with 'Victorian Britain' this week.
You need to read it carefully as it will be the basis for your topic work. The pages this week are about family life in the Victorian times.











Family Life



FAMILY LIFE

Families were an important part of Victorian life. Many of them were large. In 1870, the average family had five or six children. Most upper and middle class families lived in large and comfortable houses. Each member of the family had a particular role to play.

- In the drawing room of a wealthy household in the 1880s. This family has finished dinner. The butler is handing round a tray of drinks while a housemaid tends the fire. Many families would spend the evenings making their own kinds of entertainment, including:
- playing the piano and singing
- reading aloud from the latest novels or books of poetry
- playing cards, chess or dominoes
- playing parlour games such as forfeits or charades
- playing billiards. (This was for the men only, as it gave them a chance to smoke their cigars.)




The father was the head of the household. He was often a stern figure, who was obeyed without question. While he went out to work every weekday, the mother looked after the house. In a middle class family, the children spent most of their time in the nursery, where they were brought up by a nanny. They might see their parents only once a day, before they went to bed. When the children grew up, only the sons were expected to work. They joined the army, or trained to be parsons, doctors or lawyers. The daughters stayed at home with their mother. Their career was to get married as soon as possible.


All households, except the very poorest, had servants to do the daily work. Most important were the cook and the butler. The cook was in charge of shopping for food and running the kitchen, where she was helped by kitchen and scullery maids. The butler received visitors at the front door, and waited on the family of the house. Housemaids cleaned the rooms, while footmen did the heavier work, such as carrying coal and parcels.

Many young people came from the country to be servants in town houses. They felt lucky to have such good jobs, which gave them somewhere to live and clothes to wear. Being a servant was one of the few jobs a woman could find, apart from factory work. On average, they earned about £50 a year. They might spend all their working lives with the same household.

- the father wore a coat, close-fitting trousers, and white shirt with cravat collar
- the children wore similar clothes to their parents.



- Powerful adjectives
 - Verbs
 - Adverbs







Continue to work on your pictures, making improvements and adding details.

Remember what you learned last week about 'hatching' and 'cross hatching' and try to use this to add details of the shading to your picture. Look at the outline of the shaded shape. For example, on this pleat of Alice's dress the shading forms a long



curved, slightly triangular shape.

(similar to this).... So you could draw the outline very lightly of the shape you can see and then add shading.

Instead of just colouring it in... have a go at using cross hatching.

Or be brave and just add the hatching lines straight on, looking carefully at the shading


you are copying!

Notice where you need to use single lines and when it is cross hatching!

Continue building up the shading on your character and in the back ground. Focus on just one small area of the picture at a time and draw what you see.

This can take a long time and doesn't have to be done in one go. Remember that sometimes drawing takes several drafts and lots of amendments. (Think back to Austin's butterfly.) It is important to try different techniques and work through the process.

It doesn't have to be perfect. Enjoy trying and I hope to be able to see some of your work so please keep it all safe to show me if you would like to!

Science Activity

Our Summer topic is all about materials and their properties and last week we looked at different solids dissolving or not dissolving in water. When a solid object (solute) is mixed with a liquid (solvent) they become a mixture (solution). This can be very frustrating because sometimes we want to separate the solution back into the two original parts. This process is called filtration and this is what our experiment will be all about!

What you will need:

- > A mug
- > A clear glass
- > Some sort of paper (newspaper or printer paper will work fine)
- > A tea bag or a spoonful of dirt.

Step 1: rip the tea bag open and at it to the mug



Step 2: add your water to the tea



Step 3: Add paper to it. Make sure the paper isn't touch

the bottom



Step 4: Now pour your tea, water solution over the paper.



Step 5: you may want to spoon out any extra tea at the bottom of the cup




Step 6: Now wait and watch. What do you notice?

- Will any tea slip through?
- Will the water change colour?

Year 5, just avo go ©

Nurture recently went on a trip to the Hogsmill Community Garden where we planted avocado seeds. It took 3 months on average for the seeds to germinate, but can you see in the photo how tall the avocado plant has grown in just a few weeks?! Grow your own avocado plant...go on, avo go! You don't need to have a garden, just an avocado stone, some toothpicks and an old jar or cup.

Instructions: -

Peel the brown skin from the stone. Place 3 toothpicks around the top of the avocado-the bottom of the stone will have a small circle, where the roots will start to grow. Some avocado stones are more pointed at the top.

Balance it in the top of the jar/cup (the toothpicks will hold it in place) and fill with enough water to cover the bottom third of the avocado stone. Place on a sunny windowsill and...wait! You have to be very patient with an avocado!

Change the water once a week to keep it clean. If you are lucky, over a number of weeks the stone will gradually split in half and the roots will start to appear in the water, as the plant stem starts to grow from the top.

Now your avocado plant will grow more quickly. You can keep the plant just in the container of water for up to a year!

Once your plant is fully grown (and planted in soil) it can take ten years to grow an avocado....
