



Dear Families,

I know many of you are concerned about Met Office heatwave alert for Monday and Tuesday which has now increased to red. The DfE issued a clear message yesterday about children's safety during the heatwave and our local guidance has not changed since then. The school is planning to be open as usual with the measures in place that we wrote to you about earlier today. We appreciate that you may make decisions yourselves regarding your own children and the best choices for their health and wellbeing during this period.

A number of families have asked about collecting children in Reception to Year 6 after lunchtime, at 1.30pm. We are happy for this to happen, but you will need to complete this Google Form <https://forms.gle/GHvMVj4UXL1d6F8d7> so that we know who to expect to go home at this point. We can only dismiss at this one time, and not a range of different points across the afternoon.

All children **MUST** wear a hat to school and **MUST** have their water bottles. They must have sun cream on and can bring a named bottle to reapply. If they are cooler in PE kit and sandals then it is fine for them to wear this.

If there is any further update over the weekend, we will contact you by email and update the school website.

We have taken the difficult decision to postpone International Day which was due to be on Tuesday so this will be a normal school day.

Take extra care of each other over the next few days of the heatwave.

Design Technology has been made cross-curricular so the children are able to have contextual background to their learning. Throughout the DT curriculum, children are actively learning skills in cooking, textiles and structures.

Recently, the whole school was able to make exciting treats for the Queen's Jubilee. It was a huge success, in which all the children enjoyed participating.


Every time **Nursery** are baking they make the corridors smell scrumptious! They are always thinking creatively, particularly with food. They have made lots of delicious treats this year. They have made smoothies, shortbread biscuits, gingerbread and cupcakes.



Every day **Reception** are thinking creatively. During our Jubilee celebration they developed their construction skills by building castles fit for the royal family. The children have also been able to taste foods from different countries and make tasty treats.

Year 1 have thought about their planning and designing skills. They have thought about different rooms in a home, thinking carefully and labelling images to analyse the similarities and difference. The children celebrated Chinese New Year by making their own Chinese lanterns and finally will be creating their own hand puppets, beginning their exploration of textiles.

This year, **Year 2** have been very lucky with a range of DT projects. At the start of the year, the children thought about their local area and examined 'The Out of Order Telephones' in Kingston. The children were set the task to think about creating their own 'King Athelstan' telephone boxes. They thought carefully about the process to making - creating a design brief and prototype. In the Spring term, they baked delicious bread and recently made guacamole as they were thinking about Mexico in Geography. The children enjoyed mashing and stirring the ingredients.



At the start of the year, **Year 3** learnt about the Stone Age and they created their own Stone Age food for a character called UG. The children enjoyed watching the fruits shimmer but thought carefully about how cooking was very different to 2.5 million years ago. Recently, whilst learning about Africa, they tested out their sewing abilities by making their own exciting African cushions.

This year, **Year 4** crafted their own Ancient Egyptian artefact by making a 'Shaduf'. The children explored their woodwork skills by clamping and sawing the wood safely. Thinking like architects the children had to think carefully about how they could assemble their pieces of wood successfully to create a device which could lift water from wells.

Year 5, have had many Super Learning Days incorporating their Design Technology learning. At the start of the year, they made their own Viking boats, using their textile and structural skills. In the Spring term, they enjoyed learning about Greece whereby they sampled some Greek foods and then made delectable Greek pancakes with honey



and sugar on top. Soon, they will be making their own Victorian toys. They have begun their learning by making simple spinners.



Year 6 have evolved their skills by putting key skills together everything they have learnt over the years. At the start of the year, they explored their textile skills by making cuddly toys. They used their topic 'The Unknown' to create their own unknown creature. Using a range of stitches, the children were able to successfully make their toys. More recently, the children created their own board games. They started this process by thinking about the features of these games and what had made them successful.

This is the Hogsmill Herald, a wonderful publication produced by a group of intrepid Y5 (and other) students, led by David, Harry, Roan and Sam.
