Dear Families,

Wow, what amazing weather this week. It's been lovely to have so much sunshine. Many thanks for ensuring your children are appropriately prepared for the heat with sun hats and water bottles.

This is an incredibly busy time of year for schools and we are looking forward to lots of trips and events in the coming weeks.

We wanted to take this opportunity to remind families that school attendance is statutory and children must attend at all times unless they are unwell. We are unable to authorise term time holidays, including leaving before the summer holiday officially begins or returning late in September. Starting later than their peers in September does not support the children's emotional wellbeing. They miss crucial time where class expectations and routines are set. Learning starts immediately. It also means that they would start the year as 'persistently absent' in terms of attendance. Children return to school on Monday 5th September 2022. EYFS children have been, or will be given, their individual start date. Thank you for your understanding and support.

We completed these tasks on traditional slate boards, which were a contrast to our regular whiteboards. Once finished, we

We will be learning about what it was like in Tudor times to live and work in a busting palace and the famous characters who lived there such as Henry VIII and his 6 poor wives! We are sure to impress the staff at Hampton Court with our fantastic Tudor knowledge and we can't wait to get on the boat and arrive in true Henry VIII fashion!

Year 3 are learning about famous inventors and their inventions! 


PRIDE Assembly
