#### Online Safety

From time to time we have issues in school where children become involved in inappropriate or upsetting messages or 'chats' on social media, often late at night. We would like to remind families of the age restrictions for the

most common sites. No children in primary school should have an account or be using any of these sites unsupervised. We would encourage all families to do two things to help keep children safe online:

- Check your child's phone daily so that you know what is going on. This can also open dialogue with your child about any worries they have.
- Do not let your child take their phone to bed, but leave it somewhere in an agreed safe space. This will stop children seeing messages which might make them frightened or worried at night.

## Healthy Food

Please remember that children in KS2 should bring in fruit and/or vegetables to eat at breaktime to keep them going until lunch. Many children already bring a banana, apple or carrots, for example. If school has any spare fruit/veg from EYFS or KS1, we are happy to give it to children in KS2 but we cannot do this on a regular basis. We do not permit children to eat crisps, chocolate or other unhealthy snacks and sweets at breaktime, and preferably not in lunchboxes either. Please leave these for occasional treats at home. Home-Start - this charity provides a vital lifeline for local families with children under five. At its heart are the parent/carer volunteers who give their time to help other parents who are struggling to cope. They support them to manage their own issues as well as helping their pre-school children to be ready for nursery and school. If you have some free time after Easter, and you are a parent/carer or grandparent, you could help other families with pre-school children. Home-Start is offering a free course to train you to be a home-visiting volunteer, supporting families with difficulties such as post-natal illness, bereavement or disability. The course will run in Kingston Borough 9.45am-2.30pm, on Thursdays from 4 May to 22 June (not half-term 1 June). After the course, you would visit a family for 2-3 hours a week.
